Before the dance:

 Notify the Super Square Head, Stephanie Stevens, (408-871-9525) of any needed changes to assigned dates.

- On scheduled night, the designated Square Heads should arrive by 6:15 PM.and stay until clean up is finished around 9:45 PM. A Katydids member with a key will open the doors and will secure the hall at end of evening.
- Check the restrooms for supplies & tidiness.
- Make coffee (located on Katydids' shelf in the storage room) and ice water using provided plastic cubes stored in plastic ziplock bags in the freezer.
- Sweep the floor as necessary & set up the sign-in table.
- Bring out additional chairs from storage room as needed.
- Set up drinks and supplies on counter.
- After the first tip, place snacks, located on the Katydids' shelf in the kitchen, on the back table at back of the hall along with paper goods, sanitizer and flyers

During Club dance:

- Welcome everyone as they enter.
- Collect a \$5.00 donation from each guest and have them sign in. "Regular" guests sign the prepared sheet, new guests sign the guest book.
- In the green box, there is an envelope with petty cash for making change.
- Offer raffle tickets: 5 tickets for \$1.00.
- In the green box, there are envelopes for keeping track of money collected during the evening.
- Divide the raffle proceeds with 50% to the Club, 50% to the winner. (Note: odd dollar goes to the winner!)
- Check that coffee, water & cups do not run out during the evening.
- After announcements and raffle, feel free to dance except for the last tip (unless you are needed to fill a square) when you will need to be putting things away and cleaning up

After the dance:

- · If Treasurer is not present, pass monies collected to any Executive Board Member.
- Pack up the sign-in items, leftover snacks and flyers.
- Empty coffee pot and dry the cooler and pack up other supplies and return them to the shelf in storage room.
- · Wipe counter and tables where needed.
- Empty garbage can if more than half full. The dumpster is located in the side parking lot.
- Sweep up crumbs from the floor as needed.
- Return extra chairs to the storage room
- Notify the Quartermaster, Lloyd (408-482-9320) of any replacement supplies needed for the next week.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Hi Katydids

It's come to my attention that most members don't know what I do as President of the Katydids so here is a list of what I do.



I set the agenda and preside over all board meetings and general meetings. I make the announcements at club dances. I send out an email reminder to all members and guests every Thursday about club happenings.

I handle negotiations and contracts for the caller and cuer for both the Club and the Sweetheart Dance. I handle the contract and specify what tables and chairs we will need and the way we need them set up with the facility for our sweetheart dance. I make sure the Sweetheart caller is picked up from and returned to the airport and he has a place to stay and meals while he is here and has the sound equipment he needs to call our dance. I also stop by the facility and pay them two weeks before the dance. I pick up the key the day before the dance and return it after the dance. I order the ribbons and dangles we need for the dance and the new member badges we need for new members.

I keep track of and store most of the Katydids property that is used at the dances, hoedowns, special events, and the picnic every year. I go and reserve the picnic site at the city every year and chair the picnic. I purchase the food and supplies that we need for the picnic. I come early to the picnic to clean the area before everyone gets there and I do most of the cooking.

I make sure that the treasurer pays the insurance on time and I audit the bank accounts for the club.

I maintain the <u>www.Katydids.org</u> web site for the club at no cost to the Club. I make up the new member packets and many flyers using my printers at no cost to the club.

As Quartermaster I make sure there are ample kitchen supplies for the dance every Friday night. I buy needed supplies for the kitchen when needed. I am responsible to make sure that all other board members are doing their job.

I store the used square dance clothes that we sell every August at our Hot August Night dance. I need to load it up in a borrowed truck and bring it to the dance each time we have a sale and after the sale I load it back up on the truck and take it home to store any remaining items until the next sale.

- Time spent at home just enjoying



From the Kitchen of – –Janna Standridge

* *R E V I S E D* *

CHOCOLATAE MOUSSE PIE WITH GRAHAM CRACKER CRUST

Graham Cracker Crust

9" Deep dish
1 1/2 c.or9x13" baking dish
2 c.Graham Cracker, medium fine crumbs
Sugar6 T.8 T.Salted Butter, melted

Mix all together . Press into dish

Bake in 375°F oven for 9 minutes. Cool

Pie Filling

12 oz semi-sweet chocolate chips (Nestle's is just fine)

1 whole egg, room temp

2-4 T. rum**

Don't use spiced or flavored rums

Don't overdo the liquor or your pie will be bitter and/or runny

2 egg yolks, room temp

2-4 T. Rum** DELETE

2 egg whites, room temp

2 c. whipping cream, chilled, divided in half

2 t. pure vanilla extract, divided in half

4 T. powdered sugar, divided in half

1 square unsweetened chocolate

Choose to prepare a 9' deep pie dish OR a 9x13" baking dish and prepare following the directions above. Then:

Melt chips over a double boiler (make sure NO water gets into the chocolate). Remove from heat. One at a time beat in whole egg, then one at a time add egg yolks, beat until glossy. Stir in rum.

Use an electric mixer to beat egg whites until stiff. Set aside. (Eggs, bowl & beaters should be room temp.) Clean beaters

Put a separate mixing bowl & beaters in freezer for 10 min. Using chilled bow & beaters, whip 1 c. whipping cream, 1 T powered sugar, 1 tsp vanilla, until stiff. Gently fold egg whites and whipped cream into chocolate mixture. Pour into pie shell. Chill at least 30 min. Before serving, put mixing bowl & beaters in freezer for 10 minutes. Whip last 1 c. whipping cream, 1 tsp vanilla & 3 T. powdered sugar until stiff. Spread whipped cream on top of pie, creating peaks. Use a vegetable peeler to shave unsweetened chocolate on top. Enjoy!

Notes:

The crust can be made up to a week ahead.

The pie filling can be made a day ahead.

The crust & filling take about 1 hour, not counting chilling time.

This pie can also be made without liquor, too.

**50 ml bottles are just perfect for this recipe. I usually get these at BevMo.

**You can also use other liquors in place of Rum

Grand Marnier: For an orange-chocolate flavor Frangelico: For a hazelnut-chocolate flavor Chambord: For a raspberry-chocolate flavor

In honor of the recent National Winnie the Pooh day on Friday, January 18th ...

Why Winnie the Pooh is called Pooh?



Since A.A. Milne published the first official Winnie the Pooh story in 1926, the character has become beloved by children across many generations. Milne's writing clearly struck a chord, and the character's many subsequent TV and film adaptations have endeared him to an even wider audience

But why is Winnie called a *Pooh* rather than a bear? Given that most children (and grown-ups, for that matter) have a different idea of what a pooh is, how has the name stuck?

The answer lies back in the 1920s.

In fact, when first introduced by Milne, Winnie wasn't even Winnie. Initially, he went by the name of Edward Bear, before changing to Winnie in time for that aforementioned official 1926 debut. The "Winnie" part of the name came from a visit to the London Zoo, where Milne saw a black bear who had been named after the city of Winnipeg, Canada.

As for Pooh? Well, originally Pooh was a swan, a different character entirely.

In the book (the same book that introduced Edward Bear), Milne wrote a poem, telling how Christopher Robin would feed the swan in the mornings.

He told how Christopher Robin had given the swan the name of "Pooh," explaining that "This is a very fine name for a swan, because if call him and he doesn't come (which is a thing swans are good at), then you can pretend that you were just saying 'Pooh!' to show him how little you wanted him."


Milne indeed knew what he was doing by using such a word. The names "Winnie" and "Pooh" were soon brought together and Winnie the Pooh was born. Milne still took a little time out to explain why Winnie was a Pooh, though.

As he would write in the first chapter of the first *Winnie the Pooh* book, "But his arms were so stiff ... they stayed up straight in the air for more than a week, and whenever a fly came and settled on his nose he had to blow it off. And I think — but I am not sure — that *that* is why he is always called Pooh."

It's not the most convincing explanation, but it's a formal explanation nonetheless.

Not that the reasoning ultimately mattered too much. The name stuck, having never seen a focus group in its life. A much loved childhood character, with a vaguely funny name, would go on to superstardom. And even be honored with his own holiday, Winnie the Pooh Day, which occurs annually on January 18th.



Meet Our Members!

Janua Standridge

Janna loves to dance! She has recently joined Katydids after Jim recommended that she come check it out and we are so glad she is dancing with us!

Janna is the eldest of four children and grew up in the Strawberry Park area of San José which is located near Saratoga and 280. In the 50's, most of the valley was still orchards and, as the name implies, Strawberry Park was covered in strawberry fields. Janna would bike through the fields and orchards on her way to ballet and art class. If you've ever wondered why Janna's nail art always looks stunning, it's because of those years of art classes! Her father was a Logistics & Analysis Engineer and was one of the first 100 employees at the Sunnyvale Lockheed plant. Her mother was active in the church choir, the PTA, and was one of the Leaders of the largest Girl Scout troop in the valley (56 girls!). Janna was a very active Girl Scout up through high school and the Scouts did all sorts of activities, including putting on a full musical, taking lots of camping trips, learning to ride a horse, and going door to door selling cookies. No setting up in front of the grocery store! It was in Girl Scouts, too, that Janna learned to make the delicious chocolate mousse recipe that she made to share with us for Mousse Night and was so kind as to publish in the January edition of the Chirper [ed note: revised recipe elsewhere in this issue]. Hooray for needing a cooking badge! Janna's future husband, Lloyd Standridge, grew up 4 blocks away from Janna. The two went to school together and their families intertwined in many ways, as often happens in small neighborhoods. They never dated in high school, though, and didn't start dating until they happened to meet each other again two years into college. In October 1980, Lloyd and Janna got married... In the midst of the annual October heat wave. It had been 115 all week and the wedding venue at Alum Rock Park was closed due to fire danger. The day of the wedding, it cooled down to just 105. For your average couple, this would have been a disaster, but since Lloyd was a park ranger, he was able to make sure all the wedding guests were allowed into the park!

Janna has been square dancing for over 43 years. As many stories start, there was a boy. Actually there were two. They were part of the Jr. High Photo Club and thought that Janna's enthusiasm would fit right in at the square dance club they danced with. It was a kids square dance club called Poke-A-Dot Squares and the kids ranged in age from 8-18. Apparently the caller had 8 children and needed some inventive way of keeping track of where they all were. (They're all still in the same square?) Anyway, as is somewhat typical of dancing endeavors, especially in Jr. High, Poke-A-Dot Squares was low on boys, so Janna got the opportunity to learn both parts straightaway, which has often come in handy! She danced with them for three years before high school activities (ahem, boys... and Scouts, sports, drama, 2 choirs, 14 clubs & commissions, honor roll and, did I mention boys?) outweighed dancing with little kids on Friday nights. Which leads us to high school equation time:

> If Boys > X and X= Square Dancing then Boys > Square Dancing

Getting back into square dancing as an adult again involved a guy, but this one she originally met in kindergarten, Lloyd Standridge. Lloyd was working as park ranger at Alum Rock Park and, after a while, his fellow park rangers noticed that he was still dating the same girl. They convinced him to bring her to the new beginner's square dance class that the Gadabouts club was starting. The caller was a nationally known caller, Joe Johnson. A month into the class, they were the only new dancers left, so the club taught them at club level. You learn *really* fast that way! Later, when Joe fell ill, Jim Osborne, a promising new caller, filled in for him and eventually became the permanent caller for the Gadabouts. After about a year and a half of dancing, Lloyd suffered two injuries that ended his dancing day. First, he injured a knee and, two weeks later, he injured the opposite ankle doing rescues off the cliff face in Alum Rock Park. Knowing how much Janna loved to dance, though, he encouraged her to keep dancing without him. While Janna dances, Lloyd is happily at home playing chess and video games or doing sudoku and crossword puzzles. He also gets his own special portion of whatever amazing cooking creation Janna has made! He still gets to tease her, too, that "she looks like a little girl's lampshade" in all her petticoats! Janna was dancing with the Gadabouts when they merged with the Krazy Dazy's and, when it looked like the Krazy Dazy's might be coming to an end, Jim recommended that Janna visit the Katydids where she has happily found a new square dancing home. Over the years, Janna has also helped with numerous beginner classes, has done multiple demos, has worn holes in her shoes dancing the length of parade routes and has even appeared on TV, turning over the money raised by square dancers as part of the MD marathon.

Janna worked in corporate purchasing for about 20 years for tech companies, including Samsung. Later she worked for 17 years for J.C.Penney's at the Vallco store, mainly supervising fashion jewelry. In addition to retail, she also got to dress mannequins, put together store windows, and her favorite part was matching the colors and styles to the current apparel. She spent one year in fine jewelry and finished in intimate apparel & sleepwear. When the Vallco Penney's closed, Janna made a point of redirecting resources, which otherwise would have ended up in the dumpster, to non-profit and needy groups. Some went to Teacher's Resources and Habitat For Humanity, 7 car loads of office supplies went to four different school districts, 2 pick-up truck loads went to libraries, and multiple truck loads of carts, mannequins, 1 story ladders, Christmas trees & large ornaments were brought to History San José, the San José Fire Museum, and Christmas in the Park. Three square dance groups also benefited from this distribution and they received over-sized decorations (hearts, flowers, butterflies, snowflakes, etc.) to use for decorating at hoedowns. Currently, for a few weekends each year, you can find Janna selling Christmas trees at a Christmas tree farm in the Los Gatos mountains. You cut down the tree, she takes your money! Her husband, Lloyd, always the outdoor type, worked for the City of San José as one of the first Park Rangers (Badge #3) and later transferred to be a city gardener, union rep, and contract negotiator. He retired after 32 years with the city.

Outside of square dancing Janna has lots of other interests and hobbies, many of which she shares with her husband, Lloyd. Many of you have enjoyed the award winning jams, jellies, syrups & relishes Janna brings to club nights and hoedowns, but it's a collaborative effort. Lloyd is the production department (That's right, he makes the good stuff!) and Janna is the supply, promotion, distribution, and reclaim departments. Year after year Lloyd wins multiple ribbons at the Santa Clara County Fair for his canned goods. Janna usually is winning in the Table Setting category. Janna excels at decorating with a theme! Besides canning, both love to cook and bake, though, if you can imagine, Janna credits Lloyd with being a much more creative cook! Food Network & the Cooking Channel are favorites for both of them. Both grew up camping and embracing the outdoors, fishing & photographing nature. Lloyd introduced Janna to country western music and she introduced him to musicals and symphonies. Throw in rock & roll, swing, jazz, and choral music and you'll get the musical picture. They also love books, old movies (TCM is a must-have!), gardening, art, the rich and varied PBS programming, science, history, model trains (HO & G scale) and the San José & SF Giants. They also share a love of chocolate. Sometimes, they are even willing to share their chocolate with each other.... True Love!

Janna's creative excitement goes beyond food and has led to many years of costuming – historical, theatrical, and fantasy. You may have seen her on TV or in photos in the newspaper when she waves to the crowds in period costumes for the 4th of July "Rose, White & Blue Parade" or the Willow Glen "Founders Day" parades. Most of you have seen a number of her unique costumes, but did you know her turquoise "walking jellyfish" led to her being a published author? Through her connections in the Greater Bay Area Costumers Guild, she was convinced to write an article on how to recreate the "jellyfish" and it was published in the May 2017 on-line costumer's magazine "Virtual Costumer."

A love of history and experience with modeling, photography and theater have helped triggered the creative thrill and inspiration to craft and wear all manner of costumes and has trained Janna to look for the details that make a costume distinctive and accurate. When History San José offered extensive costume classes, she took every one. The result was historical costumes were created from the skin out, hats to spats! Janna has also volunteered at History San José 3+ days a week for nearly 40 years and, in her time there, she has been involved with many areas including:

- Portraits of the Past, which are fashion shows +vignettes so you get to learn Valley history and see pretty dresses at the same time.
- Providing ambiance for historical and children's events.
- Gardening in multiple flower gardens and the extensive veggie garden, which, in the summer, often allows her to deliver 150 lbs/week to Second Harvest Food Bank
- Head Holiday Elf, in which she is responsible for designing and decorating the 13 acres of buildings and grounds at History San José
- Gallery Guide
- Collections conservationist and exhibit support. This role requires extensive knowledge of how to properly display the costumes so that she can dress the mannequins in addition to knowledge of how to archive them. She is responsible for photographing, conserving, and entering descriptions for on-line viewing of the textiles, furs and hat collections.

Janna and Lloyd have always made a point to give back and share with the community, whether by donating time, resources, the vote or the bounty from the garden. They try to help bring a positive outcome to today and the future. Hopefully Janna's enthusiasm is infectious enough to energize you to hop right up and join the fun that's brought us together, square dancing. Square Up!
